"I didn't know there were so many jobs within the airport. We got to see where the snowplows and other equipment is, and we got to see the people who deal with the wildlife," Payton said.

DIA partners with the U.S. Department of Agriculture wildlife services, which provides a full-time staff at the airport.

A wildlife manager told the students that -large birds of prey pose a danger to aviation, so they are humanely trapped and relocated.

"They release them 75 to 100 miles away and put trackers on them before they release them, so they know if they come back," Payton said.

Byers junior Michael Husted was also a participant in the field trip.

"I grew up around aviation and I wanted to see the ins and outs of

DIA," he said. Michael's grandparents own two planes and have an airstrip on their property 10 miles south of Byers. His grandfather is a Designated Airwor-



thiness Representative for the Federal Aviation Administration. His father is an airline mechanic at DIA.

Michael is currently working on pilot licensure and is considering a career in aeronautical engineering. He is very familiar with airports from a pilot and passenger perspective, but he enjoyed learning about the business side of the operation.

"The scale of it all is really cool," he said. "We went out onto the runway and it's amazing to see how big it is. They talked about everything it takes to get the airplanes to the runway and take off. It's really in-

teresting." REAP Executive Director Kip Cheroutes said he sees workforce development for high school students as an economic development priority.

ture. My ears perked up."

Cheroutes met with Byers High School Principal Kelly Boren and counselor Jessica Fournier to discuss involving students in economic development, then contacted DIA Manager of Regional Affairs Rachel Gruber, who was enthusiastic about a field trip.

"REAP was the connector to all this," he added.

Cheroutes met the Byers group at DIA and joined them for the tour. He believes the trip accomplished its purpose.

"Èyes were most definitely opened," he said, adding he had an "interesting interaction" with a student who asked about IT (information technology) opportunities at the airport. "While we were on the bus driving around the runways, the tour guide, who was the DIA director of operations, talked about the decisions an airline has to make whether or not to cancel a flight due to bad weather or some other circumstances. The airline has to weigh all the different costs involved in going or not going, like deicing fluid and the extra fuel you expend if you're in a long line on a wintry day.'

Cheroutes recalled he turned to the student and said, "That's an algorithm. Some airline employee had to write code and come up with a computer program the airline could use to analyze the costs and quickly give an answer."

Cheroutes envisioned a light bulb going off in the student's head.

"He realized how you apply IT to a specific an airline situation," he said. "It was an aha moment for him and a cool thing for me." Cheroutes said he has approached the other Corridor high schools to discuss career development and will continue those efforts next school year. "I'm also hoping to help arrange field trips to other job centers, such as CORE Electric, which has already indicated willingness to host students," he added. "This will be an ongoing priority for REAP."

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"A few months back I heard (DIA CEO) Phil Washington at the Aurora Chamber of Commerce talking about Vision 100, the goal of the airport to grow to accommodate 100 million passengers a year," Cheroutes told The I-70 Scout May 13. "He talked about the importance of developing a work force for the fu-

newal documentation at the end of each academic term of their chosen college, remain on track to graduate with a bachelor's degree within four academic years, maintain academic performance, adhere to a code of conduct, and stay in regular communication with the Daniels Fund.

"The scholarship is almost like a lifestyle — it's an experience within itself," Faczak said, adding he will attend an orientation conference in June. "I'll meet all the people behind the scholarship at that. After I graduate from college, I can come back and help be a part of the organization itself."

Jack credited three staff members for helping him through the scholarship application process — athletic director Rick Jacoby, agriculture teacher and FFA sponsor Brittaney Hudson, and counselor Nicole Eby.

"I really respect Mr. Jacoby. He was able to give me a recommendation. He's been a consistent part of my life and he's super awesome," Faczak said. "Miss Hudson [introduced] me to the scholarship — I wouldn't have known about it without her. She kept me ahead of the curve. And Miss Eby helped me before the interview."

When asked what has motivated him to succeed, Faczak showed wisdom beyond his 18 years.

"I believe that life comes down to choices, and that every moment is a choice that you make," he said. "I try to choose in that moment what is best for me."

"There was a point of time when I was not at my best," he added. "I decided I didn't want to go out being mediocre or not at my best. I decided I was going to choose to be better than that — choose to be invested and to be 'all in' with everything I do.

"Wrestling, football, academics, everything — all in."
