Byers fireman convicted of sex assau

CENTENNIAL — A former Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office employee that was recently convicted in a sex assault lawsuit appears to also be waiting on his work status with an I-70 Corridor emergency response jurisdiction.

An Arapahoe County jury Sept. 2 found Caleb Andrew May, 20, guilty of criminal attempt to commit sexual assault, a class 5 felony, and two counts of fourth-degree felony sexual exploitation of a child from an incident involving a juve-

nile female in early May of last year in Centennial. Sentencing is scheduled for 3 p.m., Monday, Nov. 7, in Division 207 of Arapahoe County District Court.

May, who was an Explorer for the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office before his full-time employment by the department as a community service specialist, met with the under-18 victim, who is also an ex-

plorer/cadet with the sheriff's office, in the parking lot of the King Soopers at 7575 S. University Blvd., on May 3, 2021.

According to the sheriff's office, the underage victim was left alone in her car in the parking lot when May, who was driving a marked sheriff's office vehicle, approached and eventually entered the passenger side of the victim's vehicle. The victim told a sheriff's officer that May made unsolicited aggressive, sexual advances towards

Bennet: New law will pare Medicare costs

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Seniors will benefit from the Medicare

program improvements included in the Inflation Reduction Act signed into law last month. Colorado U.S. Senator Michael Bennet and AARP

Colorado held a Bennet telephone town hall

touting the benefits of the climate, tax and health care bill Sept. 8. The

act addresses prescription drug costs for seniors by requiring Medicare to negotiate drug prices, capping prescription drug outof-pocket costs to \$2,000 a year, and preventing pharmaceutical companies from hiking drug prices above inflation adjustments.

Bennet, speaking from Washington, D.C., before heading home to Colorado for the weekend, noted. "The Inflation Reduction Act is one of the most important bills that we've passed in a generation."

Priola recall gathers steam

DENVER — A petition drive to recall Colorado State Sen. Kevin Priola gained further footing last Friday after the Secretary of State's Office approved the document's language.

While I-70 Corridor residents in Adams County have been represented by Priola in the 25th Senate District since 2017, they won't be allowed to sign the petition asking for a special election to recall the senator, who switched parties from Republican to Democrat last month.

According to the Secretary of State's Sept. 9 announcement, recall proponents can only "collect signatures from constituents in Senate District 13, based on the new map that went into effect in 2022."

Priola's new district is based around Greeley, covers other Weld County communities — including Evans, LaSalle, Milliken, Gil-

Platteville crest, and Fort Lupton and far north central Adams County, predominantly Henderson and Brighton.

While at least 18,291 valid signatures must be col-

lected from registered voters in District 13 by Nov. 8, that figure is the result of calculations from the 2020

election in Priola's old district. "The signature threshold for sufficiency was determined based on voter counts from the 2020 election in Senate District 25 per Colorado state law," the Secretary of State's statement said, citing cooperation

her and, after she said no, May responded "just let me do it."

"[The victim] confirmed that at no time did she consent to May's actions," the arrest affidavit said. "Later that evening, [the victim] sent May a text message asking him to leave her alone. May replied, stating that he was sorry and asked if she was going to report him."

During the victim's May 5 interview with sheriff's officers, texts and calls between the victim and May occurred where the suspect reportedly stated remorse, including he wanted to apologize;" "he didn't mean for it to go down that way;" and "it was not OK."

May was taken into custody at 1:30 a.m. May 6 after about an hour-and-15-minute interview with investigators at sheriff's office headquarters.

"May admitted that he did in fact go to the King Soopers parking lot on May 3, 2021, and meet with [the victim] in her vehicle while he was wearing [a sheriff's office] uniform and driving [a sheriff's office] vehicle," the arrest affidavit said. "He admitted that he hugged her, kissed her. ... He stated that he knew what he was doing was wrong. ..."

The jury's Sept. 2 verdict occurred on the fourth day of the originally scheduled three-day trial.

As of Sept. 9, May appeared to still be a member of the Byers Fire Rescue, but discussion on his status was expected at the Sept. 12 Byers Fire Protection District board meeting, which occurred after press time.

"At this time, [we] have no comments until after our board meeting on Monday, so we can discuss as a group," said Byers Fire Chief Mike Disher during a Sept. 9 e-mail

exchange with The I-70 Scout. A late July post on the fire district's Facebook page showed May remained a member of the fire department.

May was released from his sheriff's office duties soon after his ar-

"We are aware of the guilty verdict in Mr. May's trial," said the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office in a Sept. 4 statement. "He was terminated immediately after [the] criminal investigation by sheriff's office investigators and the filing of charges with the district attorney's office.

"We hope this verdict helps the victim and their family begin the healing process."

The sheriff's office Explorer program is for youth ages 14-20 "with an interest in law enforcement." According to the department's website, participants are trained in several aspects of police work, experience ride-a-longs with deputies, and volunteer for community service.

"They do not carry weapons and they are not law enforcement officers," the website said of participants in the program.

Winners, losers in water cuts for Western states explained

WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP) — People in Arizona and Nevada won't face bans on watering their lawns or washing their cars despite water shortages on the Colorado River.

But officials said Aug. 16 that less water will be available next year from the river that serves 40 million people in the West and Mexico. Observers say a reckoning is still coming for the growing region.

New cuts will build on this year's reductions — which all but eliminated some central Arizona farmers' Colorado River water supply and, to a much lesser extent, reduced Nevada and Mexico's share.

The decision and what was omitted point to growing uncertainty in the West.

Lake Mead and Lake Powell the two largest reservoirs on the Colorado River — are about a quarter full, threatening water supplies and the generation of hydroelectric power used by millions of people.

Along the reservoirs' edge, "bathtub rings" of minerals outline where the high water line once stood, highlighting the challenges the West is facing as a "megadrought" tightens it grip on the region.

WHICH STATES WILL THE CUTS AFFECT?

Arizona was hardest hit, again, and will receive 79% of its total share next year. But that's only 3% less than what it got this year, after federal officials slashed its supply.

Nevada will receive about 92% of

its total supply next year. Most residents will not feel the cuts thanks to conservation and reuse and that the state does not use its full Colorado River allocation.

California has been spared from cuts because it has more senior water rights than Arizona and Nevada.

Mexico will get roughly 93% of its total supply. The water is used in cities and farming communities in northwestern Mexico, where a severe drought is also occurring.

WHOSE WATER SUPPLY WILL BE CUT?

Farmers in central Arizona. among the state's largest producers of livestock, dairy, alfalfa, wheat and barley, lost most of their Colorado River allocation last year when the government announced its first shortage. Some farmers were compensated with water through deals with cities like Phoenix and Tucson.

More farmers will likely need to fallow land — which some of the region's farmers have been paid to do and rely even more on groundwater. Others will have to grow more water-efficient crops.

Western water suppliers have planned for shortages by diversifying and conserving their water supply. Still, regular cuts amid intensifying drought that is depleting reservoirs faster than scientists predicted will make it harder to plan for the future.

Phoenix, the nation's fifth-largest city, will lose some water it would otherwise store in underground basins as a water savings account, said Cynthia Campbell, the city's water resource management advisor. ies and other reservoirs that feed That happened this year, too. The city will rely more on the in-state Salt and Verde rivers, which boost its Colorado River supplies. The city's residents will not be affected by cuts next year, Campbell added.

Meanwhile, Nevada recycles the majority of the water used indoors and doesn't use all of its Colorado River water. That means residents will barely feel next year's cuts.

WHO DOES LAKE MEAD SERVE?

Lake Mead supplies water to millions of people in Arizona, California, Nevada and Mexico.

Cuts for 2023 are triggered when predicted water levels fall below a certain threshold — 1,050 feet above sea level. Additional cuts will be triggered when projected levels sink to 1,045 and 1,025 feet. At a certain point, water levels could drop so low that water can no longer be pumped from the reservoir.

Eventually, some city and industrial water users will be affected.

Lake Powell's levels are also falling and extraordinary steps have been taken to keep water in the reservoir on the Arizona-Utah border.

After the lake fell low enough to threaten the roughly 5 billion kilowatt hours of energy generated each year at the Glen Canyon Dam, federal officials said they would hold back some water to ensure it could still produce energy. The dam powers 1 million to 1.5 million homes each year.

Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming get water from tributarinto Lake Powell. Water from three reservoirs in those states has been drained in recent years to maintain water levels at Lake Powell and protect the electric grid powered by the Glen Canyon Dam.

HOW IS THE RIVER WATER SHARED?

Water stored in Lake Mead and Lake Powell is divvied up through legal agreements among the seven Colorado River basin states, the federal government, Mexico and Native American tribes. The agreements determine how much water each entity gets, when cuts are triggered, and the order in which the parties must sacrifice some of their supply.

Under a 2019 drought contingency plan, Arizona, Nevada, California and Mexico agreed to give up shares of their water to maintain levels at Lake Mead. This year's cuts are part of that plan; as a result, they were predicted by states and others.

WHAT'S OMITTED FROM ANNOUNCEMENT?

Much more significant water cuts. In June, the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation told the basin states — Arizona, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming — to figure out a plan to use at least 15% less water from the river next year to prevent reservoir levels from dropping even further.

The deadline to reach that deal has passed and states failed to reach an agreement. Federal officials on Aug. 17 did not say how much time states will have to reach one.



Parents urged to vaccinate their kids

DENVER — As students head back to school, the Colorado Department of Public Health & Environment is asking parents and guardians to keep vaccine-preventable diseases out of classrooms.

Vaccines are available that protect children from 16 infectious diseases, including measles, whooping cough, mumps, polio and varicella (chickenpox). COVID-19 vaccines are authorized for children ages 6 months and older.

"Staying up to date on routine vaccinations for preventable diseases is critical to the public health of Colorado,"said Dr. Eric France, chief medical officer for the CDPHE.

France added that the Health Department will help families track their vaccinations. "Childhood and adolescent vaccines save lives, and all Coloradans have access to them regardless of if they have health insurance."

Parents and guardians should schedule an appointment and discuss any questions about vaccines with a health care provider. Vaccines required for school entry can be safely administered with other vaccines, including COVID-19 and flu, and many children are eligible for low-cost or free vaccines.

Yet, when the Colorado State Patrol looked at its citation data over a three-year period (2019-21), officials saw that 2021 had the highest year of citations related to pedestrians

"We're headed in the wrong direction Colorado," stated Col. Matthew C. Packard, CSP chief. "No matter if you are walking to your mailbox or going on a multi-mile bike ride, this is everyone's issue, because sooner or later everyone is a pedestrian."

From 2019-21 troopers issued 21 citations for motorists driving through or within a pedestrian safety zone.

In 63 additional incidents over the same period, troopers issued citations for motorists failing to give pedestrians and bicyclists the right of way on a crosswalk, bicycle lane or sidewalk as they emerged from an alley, driveway or building. Combining all citations over the three-year period, Colorado motorists were issued 40% of such tickets

"Our data shows that, during warmer months and congested times like the lunch hour through 8 p.m., crashes involving a pedestrian or bicyclist are much more likely,"

GOLDEN — In a contest between Packard explained. "Whether driving downtown, through your neighborhood, or around popular areas, people need to stay alert while staying out of crosswalks and bike lanes. And now schools are coming back into session, increasing the number of pedestrians during school start and end times."

> CSP troopers are taking a low tolerance approach to lane violations while continuing their yearlong campaign — "Stay in Your Lane." The campaign is designed to remind people to control their lane position based on their current driving environment.

> Failing to yield to pedestrians and bicyclists is a wide-reaching issue. When trying to determine the top five counties for such citations, five-county tie for third place occurred. The ranking is in descending order.





Receiver named for disbanding health dept.

GREENWOOD VILLAGE Tri-County Health Department announced Aug. 30 that the District Court of Arapahoe County has granted its motion to place the agency into receivership, an important step to ensure an orderly transition as TCHD prepares to formally dissolve effective Dec. 31.

The court's entry of the order had the support of Adams, Arapahoe and Douglas counties.

"Obtaining court approval to place TCHD into receivership is typical in situations like ours, and it should give creditors, staff and the community confidence that there will be a neutral and fair process as we wind down our organization at the end of the year," said Dr. John M. Douglas, Jr., TCHD executive direc-

tor. "It will also create stability for TCHD, which will allow us to continue our focus on minimizing the disruption to residents who need important public health services."

The court appointed Cordes & Company LLC as the receiver, with Bellann Raile as its sole and primary agent. She has more than 30 years of experience with receiverships.

Douglas noted that TCHD expects that all of its vendors who provide goods or services in carrying out public health programs after appointment of the receiver will be timely paid in the ordinary course of business. Other creditors holding allowed claims may be paid in their order of priority under the terms of the order appointing receiver when and if funds are available.

Bennet said the caps on out-ofpocket prescription costs will provide relief for thousands of seniors in the state.

"That's going give over 700,000 Coloradans on Medicare Part D some piece of mind that they won't have to spend down their retirement to pay for their prescriptions,"

Bennet said seniors across Colorado have shared nightmare scenarios with him.

"One woman named Gail said she's lived with Type 2 diabetes since she was 11 years old, and the vials of insulin she has to buy cost \$6 to make but she pays over \$280 for it," he said. "Gail doubted she'd ever be able to retire because she's spending all her money on insulin. I've heard stories like this all around the state."

The bill caps insulin payments to \$35 a month for seniors.

We would have capped it for everybody, but unfortunately Republicans in the Senate took that pro-"That's something we still have to fight for."

The act also extends the American Rescue Plan health insurance premium tax credits for three years — a provision that will lower health care costs for more than 150,000 Coloradans.

"This is the biggest step we've taken on health care since we passed the Affordable Care Act."

When asked when individuals will see the changes brought about by the act, Bennet said that provisions will be rolled out over several years.

In 2023, all vaccines covered under Medicare Part D, including the shingles vaccine, will be free to beneficiaries. The cost of insulin will be capped at \$35 a month, and drug companies will receive tax penalties if they impose cost increases that exceed inflation.

In 2024, the first phase of the outof-pocket cap will begin. The current "catastrophic threshold," which requires beneficiaries to pay the greater of a co-pay or 5% of the cost of the medicine, will be removed. The Extra Help, or Low-Income Subsidy program will be expanded. The program helps low-income beneficiaries with copays, coinsurance and deductibles regarding their covered prescription drugs.

Starting in 2024 and through 2029, Part D premiums will not be allowed to grow faster than 6% a year.

In 2025, out-of-pocket spending on Part D prescription drugs will be capped at \$2,000 per year.

Starting in 2026, Medicare will be empowered to begin negotiating prices with drug companies for 10 of the most expensive drugs covered under Part D.

In 2027 and 2028, 15 drugs will be eligible for negotiations and, in 2029 and subsequent years, 20 drugs will be chosen.

Bennet said long-needed changes in Medicare were finally accomplished because Congress listened to "the drumbeat from the people."

"Year after year special interests vision out of the bill," Bennet said. have prevented us from passing policies to reduce drug costs," he said. "These narrow interests [succeeded for years] but the American people didn't give up. Seniors' voices were heard loud and clear, including those who worked their entire lives and are now spending their retirement trying to figure out how to afford drugs prescribed to them. We're grateful to everyone who shared their stories."

The Strasburg Lady Indians maintained their winning ways and elevated themselves in the Class 3A softball rankings with three hardfought victories over the last two weeks, raising their record to 11-0 for the season.

The Indians defeated 3A Lyons 9-0 on Aug. 30; 4A Wheat Ridge 2-0 on Sept. 6; and 3A Brush 12-6 on Sept. 8.

Through Saturday, the Indians were ranked No. 1 in Class 3A by Maxpreps and No. 2 by the Colorado High School Activities Association.

WHEAT RIDGE

The Wheat Ridge Lady Farmers gave the Indians their toughest competition of the two-week stretch. While yielding just 2 runs to Strasburg, Wheat Ridge put plenty of runners on base.

"They had people in scoring position every inning, and our defense was just stellar," said Strasburg head coach Wes Madrill.

The defensive effort included two instances where the Farmers had runners on second and third base with no outs but didn't score.

The Indians took the lead in the fourth inning when sophomore Kailey Rushman drove home se-

nior Autumn Stone with a double in the hole. They tacked on an insurance run in the fifth when junior shortstop Gracie Graf moved from second to third base on a sacrifice fly by senior pitcher Heidi Price, then stole home when the Farmers misplayed the ball.

Price tossed a seven-hit shutout with eight strikeouts, one walk and one hit batter

with one walk and five strikeouts.

"Heidi threw a real good game even though she got hit a little bit in the fifth inning," Madrill noted. "I was kind of worried in the sixth, but Heidi came out and we threw the right pitches and we got three groundouts."

She struck out the last two Beetdiggers to finish the contest.

Heidi came on strong in the end," Madrill added.

Lady Tigers 4-0, at top of Frontier VB standings

The Bennett Lady Tigers entered their own invitational this past weekend with a 4-2 overall record and all their victories coming against Frontier League foes.

In the 10 days leading up to the 41st Tiger Invitational Sept. 10, the orange-and-black swept conference foes Bruce Randolph on the road Aug. 30, Arrupe Jesuit at home Sept. 6, and Arvada away Sept. 8, while sandwiching a three-set loss at Prospect Ridge Academy Sept. 1.

"We're starting to look like a team, playing better each time we get out on the court," said first-year Lady Tiger head coach Corissa Thornton after her sophomore-dominated squads victory over Arrupe Jesuit. "We're starting see the girls taking a lot of things they are learning in practice and executing them in games. Even if we have a setback, the girls have been working and playing hard."

ARRUPE JESUIT

In what Thornton called her squad's best match of the season, Bennett routed the visiting Generals 25-6 in the first set before taking the next two games by 25-20 scores.

"If we play like that in our previous game (the loss to Prospect Ridge Academy), I think we can win it also," Thornton said. "But our young girls are getting better every game.

In addition to more than quadrupling the visitors' kill total, 34-8, the orange-and-black recorded 17 service aces to Arrupe's three. Leading the offensive charge for the hosts were sophomores Elizabeth Westendorf and Jessica Venneberg with nine and eight kills, respectively; senior Stefanie Jordan with nine aces; and senior setter Hadleigh Christensen, who had six aces and a half-dozen kills to go along with her 26 assists.

"Our serving has been really good for the most part and, tonight, [Jordan] was just killing it," Thornton said. "[Christensen] is our lone returnee with any significant varsity time and she's been a very steadying influence. We're starting to get our execution down more consistently."

Defensively, eight Tigers scrambled to pick up 30 digs, led by Christensen with nine. At the net, Venneberg and sophomore classmate Olivia Schroeder combined for a block.

While serving and hitting have been to the Tigers benefit much of the early season, the number of errors from those two areas must be reduced. The orange-and-black recorded 17 hitting and 10 service errors against Arrupe Jesuit.

@ ARVADA

The Tigers' road trip to the west metro area two days later proved to be fruitful as they took care of business against the host Bulldogs 25-19, 25-23, 25-10.

After allowing Arvada to stay within threatening distance the first two sets because of service and hitting errors, the orange-and-black shored up its play in a dominating third set.

Bennett recorded 18 kills and 17 service aces, but also committed 12 errors at the net and another 16 from the serve line. The Tigers also had hiccups in serve receive, accumulating 11 more errors.

Westendorf and fellow sophomore Raquel Thorpe led the Tiger attack with six kills apiece. Jordan again led the visitors' dominant service game with five aces, followed by junior Lily Venneberg and seniors Martha Jordan and Rio Smith with three apiece. Christensen again facilitated the offense, recording 17 of Bennett's 18 assists.

Defensively, Bennett recorded 17 digs, led by Schroeder's five and Lily Venneberg with four.

Bennett recorded its most lopsided victory of the young season without its primary facilitator, defeating the host Grizzlies 25-8, 25-12, 25-6.





Anythink updates overdue policy

Anythink Libraries announced late last month changes to its policy regarding overdue materials, including new charges that were reinstated starting Sept. 7.

For transactions prior to this year, the library network will "clear all overdue/lost items checked out before Jan. 1, 2022, and is waiving all fines and fees created before Jan. 1, 2022."

Starting Sept. 7, library patrons that have items overdue for more than 42 days may be billed for replacement charges along with a \$10 collections processing fee.

Anythink does not charge overdue fines for late items. Customers

are sent five notifications of overdue items over a six-week period. During this time, items can be renewed or returned.

A final overdue notice is sent at 42 days, at which point, items are considered lost and can no longer be renewed. A customer's account is charged for the item and library privileges are suspended until items are returned or paid for.

"We would love to have the item back," said an Anythink announcement dated Aug. 24. " It can be returned to any Anythink branch?"





No matter what team you are rooting for, this dip is a sure winner. We sometimes have people over for an appetizer potluck.


