# Firefighters rescue Bennett resident

BENNETT — A house fire in the old part of Bennett resulted in the evacuation of an occupant and neighbors during the early morning hours Nov. 3.

Around 5 a.m. Friday, Bennett-Watkins Fire Rescue personnel and Adams County Sheriff's deputies were first on scene to a residential fire in the 300 block of Sixth Street.

Upon arrival, firefighters reportedly rescued one person who was asleep and a couple of pets from inside the house on fire and evacuated nearby neighbors for precautionary reasons. No injuries were reported.

The fire reportedly spread from the backyard earlier Thursday night into Friday morning and breached the back wall and significantly damaged the back third of the home.

Other specifics of the blaze were unavailable at press time.

# **Buck: Many GOP leaders are lying**

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Republican Rep. Ken Buck will not seek another term in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Buck, who was first elected in November 2014, has served five terms as the representative for Colorado's 4th Congressional district, which includes most of the rural Eastern

Plains and the entire I-70 Corridor.

He announced his decision to step away from the House Nov. 1 in an online video message to his constituents, in which he cited frustration with both the policies of the left and members of his own party who, he believes, are veering dangerously off course.

### METROGRO Farm works to combat wheat stem sawfly infestation

The METROGRO Farm is experimenting with a different variety of wheat and crop rotation to deal with a growing pest issue.

The 52,000-acre dryland farm is operated by Metro Water Recovery. Much like a growing number of Colorado farms, the wheat stem sawfly has proven to be a challenge in the three years since it began infesting the crops.

The sawfly's larvae feed on the upper stem of the wheat, often causing it to break just before harvest. According to a 2022 study by the Colorado Association of Wheat Growers and Colorado State University, this pest causes approximately \$33 million in damage annually to Colorado's wheat crop.

For the upcoming season, the farm is planting a new variety of winter wheat with a stronger stem that should be more difficult for the sawfly to destroy. Barley and milo crops will be rotated to stop the sawfly from spreading.

The 2023 harvest season wrapped up on Aug. 22 and was successful thanks to unusually wet spring conditions following extreme drought the year prior.

An unprecedented 26 inches of rain fell this year compared to the typical 10-12 inches. While the extra moisture helps overall quantity, it can degrade the wheat quality as the threat of fungus increases.

The crew harvested approximately 313,000 bushels of wheat this year for a yield of more than 36.5 bushels per acre. To minimize sawfly damage, 5,354 acres were swathed and windrowed before combining. About 2,000 acres of wheat were lost due to hail

As for other crops, more than 3,000 acres of milo were planted in the spring in failed wheat fields and are expected to provide good yields. Just over 71,000 bushels of milo were harvested in 2022.

### PFAS monitoring expands at Metro

Metro Water Recovery has begun monitoring biosolids for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS), along with our ongoing monitoring of the treated wastewater.

PFAS are not byproducts of the wastewater treatment process but are present in the wastewater that enters facilities from homes and businesses. All of Metro's PFAS levels meet permit requirements and sit below the trigger level for required actions.

Metro monitors and tests treated wastewater for PFAS levels established


by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, regularly sharing raw data with the public since May 2022. At the beginning of this year, Metro began monitoring and sharing PFAS data for biosolids as well.

### **Biosolids Distribution for 2023**

The chart below summarizes the breakdown of biosolids distributed to the METROGRO Farm, private farms, and a private composter for the first eight months of 2023. All biosolids produced during that period at the Robert W. Hite Treatment Facility (RWHTF) and the Northern Treatment Plant (NTP) were beneficially reused.

A total of 21,367 dry tons (104,610 wet tons) of biosolids were beneficially reused from January through August.

Dry weight is the solids from biological treatment of wastewater after all water is removed. The average METROGRO® Cake solids content for the first eight months of 2023 is 20.50% for RWHTF and 20.51% for NTP.

#### **25 YEARS AGO NOVEMBER 11, 1998**

Byers School Superintendent Mike Grandstaff had two words for Byers voters — thank you.

"We're appreciative of all the support we received from the community," he said.

Throughout the election process, Grandstaff was cautiously optimistic that Ballot Issues A and B, asking Byers taxpayers to fund much needed school additions, would pass.

"Obviously," he said, "we want what's best for the kids."

Issue A passed in Adams County 60-47 while Issue B won 63-45. In Arapahoe County, Issue A won 238-196 while Issue B passed 235-202.

This expansion will allow for more space, including more classrooms, as well as more teachers. Grandstaff added that funds will be applied directly to what kids use every day, such as a new lunchroom.

Grandstaff attributes the win to the community. He said it saw a need existed and it respond-

"Maybe that's what makes this country the best country in the world," he said of the elec-

"This is a community school. The board is going to have a lot of decisions to make."

#### **20 YEARS AGO NOVEMBER 11, 2003**

Voters in Agate School District No. 300 voted to term limit school board members, 110 yes to 107 no, and defeated a bond issue to raise \$1.8 million to add classrooms, 156 no to 61 yes.

Voters in Limon School District RE-4J voted to defeat eliminating term limits, 481 no to 269 yes, and voted to support changing the district status to at-large for all districts, 396 yes to 352 no.

#### **15 YEARS AGO NOVEMBER 11, 2008**

Bennett residents in Adams County voted against a Bennett Park & Recreation District request for a \$500,000 debit increase to supplement grant monies to finance the construction of an indoor swimming pool, aqua therapy area, and activity and classroom space in the Bennett Recreation Center.

A large portion of funding has from an Adams County Open Space grant, but another grant is needed to complete the construction, but won't be awarded until the next cycle next year. The \$50,000 from voters would have allowed the pool to be built while the second grant request goes through the county approval process.

Voters went against the request 668-545.



west," Baker said, noting that he's the lone Republican on the board of county commissioners.

Gulli added that even the recent addition of three deputies to help cover from the Watkins area to the eastern border has only led to the number of patrol teams bumping up to six.

"Not all deputies get out here every shift, so it's a problem. It's been a problem when it comes assigning shifts," said Gulli, citing the department's delayed response to a shooting incident from a large overnight gathering in the 900 block of Imboden Road south of Watkins Oct. 28. "We had one deputy that night covering from Watkins basically all the way out to almost Agate. We had a lot of assistance come from other deputies but they were coming from other areas. We also had Aurora (Police Department) and Colorado State Patrol involved."

Gulli noted that the department has nine deputies whose sole jurisdiction is the city of Centennial and that, while they will assist with violent situations farther east, Centennial officials have complained when deputies are indisposed for too long or for "simple

In addition, the hiring of officers in general has become a greater challenge.

versa) and then Florida (or are pretty much out of the somewhere else) takes them from us," said Gulli, noting his first five years as an officer were in Tempe, Ariz., before he came to Arapahoe County where he's been the past 16 years. Another area that officers have been lost to is Las Vegas.

Baker indicated that requests to strengthen law enforcement in the eastern part of the county will remain among his priorities.

But despite the difficulties with staffing, Gulli said the department continues to work hard to put a dent in criminal activity.

"Auto theft is so far down 24%," he said. "A lot of that goes to we are recovering the actual vehicles and making life hard for the bad guys. They don't like the attention, so the moment something is spotted, they

picture."

He also said that recent legislation basing penalties for auto theft on value of the vehicles stolen has helped.

#### **OTHER ARAPCO NOTES**

Baker noted that the county has already spent \$500,000 to repair or rehab eastern county roadways damaged by this past spring's flooding. Of the 15 areas of most significant damage, only the County Road 38 bridge over Bijou Creek remains, but it is open to vehicles under five tons with a maximum speed limit of 25 miles per hour. A time frame on the bridge being fully operational was unknown.

All county open spaces have been reopened after the wettest June on record, but trail and fence repair

still are required at the Richmil Ranch Open Space near Deer Trail.

Arapahoe County residents were unable to escape the statewide increase in property taxes. According to Baker, the average bump for the county is 42%, including 22% up for multifamily properties and 20% for commercial sites. Almost 31,000 appeals were filed by Arapahoe County residents with 23% resulting in a lessening of property valuation and an average tax reduction of 4.03%.

"None resulted in an increase in assessment or taxes," Baker said. "The same can't be said for some of the counties up in the mountains where people challenged and then had their property's valuation increase even more."

Baker also noted, while

he is skeptical of the projection, that state population estimates indicate the county will be the most populous in Colorado by the start of the next decade.

"If the projections of the demographers pan out, they're saying we'll surpass Denver County by 2030. That's 800,000 people," said Baker, noting the county is currently at about 657,000 residents. Just short of 50% of the county, about 323,000 people, reside in Aurora.

Baker said one of the county's priorities is concluding a water study by the end of next year. The study would address water supplies and availability through 2050.

"We hopefully are able to get it done by the end of 2024," he said. "We are trying to get ahead of the development projected coming our way.'

When it comes to county-wide reforms to oil and gas drilling rules under land development code, the second round of changes are being introduced to the planning commission this week (6:30 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 8) with the board of county commissioners expected to conduct a public hearing on the issue at 9:30 a.m., Tuesday, Nov. 14, at the county administrative offices, 5334 S. Prince St., Littleton.

### CO poet laureate announced [November Senior Specials

BOULDER - Gov. Jared Polis and the Colorado Creative Industries division of the Colorado Office of Economic Development and International Trade announced the selection of a new Colorado poet

Andrea Gibson, a Boulder-based queer activist, author and slam poet, will succeed Bobby LeFebre. She will serve in the role for two years.

"Andrea's voice holds a fierce conviction in inspiring others to pursue art and take action toward solving social issues and they personify our Colorado for all spirit," Polis said. "I know Andrea will be a strong advocate for the arts and art education as a way to bring us together, has a strong desire for unity and to bring people together through poetry."

Gibson, a four-time Denver Grand Slam Champion, centers her work around a range of topics including LGBTQIA+ issues, spirituality, feminism, mental health, gun reform, and the dismantling of oppressive systems.

"An artist's job is to redirect awe, astonishment and wonder back into people, something we were born with but culture takes out of us as we grow older," Gibson said.

Much of her work today addresses her treatment journey after she was diagnosed with Ovarian cancer two years ago. "I spent so much time writing about what was wrong with the world, now I write about







Gibson is the author of six fulllength collections of poetry. She is a two-time winner of the Independent Publishers Award, a threetime Goodreads Choice Awards Finalist, and the winner of the first Women's World Poetry Slam. In 2017, Penguin Books published "Take Me With You," an illustrated collection of Gibson's most beloved quotes, and, in 2019, Chronicle Books published her first nonfiction endeavor, "How Poetry Can Change Your Heart."

As the new Colorado poet laureate, Gibson plans to help other people fall in love with poetry.

"I want to come up with new and inventive ways to help a larger population fall in love and appreciate poetry," she said. "I want everyone to have a poem that they can go to like you would with a song. Poetry can be the vehicle that allows us to know each other and expand humanity. That's what I hope to help

do with this role."

Polis announced Gibson's appointment at the Colorado Chautauqua in her hometown, Boulder. The Colorado Chautauqua, which marks its 125th anniversary this year, fosters lifelong learning, love of nature, and cultural enrichment.

Colorado became one of the first states to name a poet laureate when Gov. Oliver Shoup appointed Alice Polk Hill in 1919. Since then eight other people have served: Nellie Burget Miller (1923-52); Margaret Clyde Robertson (1952-54); Milford E. Shields (1954); Thomas Hornsby Ferril (1979-88); Mary Crow (1996 to 2010); David Mason (2010-14); Joseph Hutchison (2014-18); and Bobby LeFebre (2019-23).

LeFebre was the youngest poet laureate and the first poet laureate of color. He has participated in more than 130 panel discussions, keynote addresses, performances and readings during his tenure as Colorado poet laureate.

county. A series of events over the next two years will allow people to engage with Joy through both performances and writing sessions.

"One of the greatest impacts that I hope to have is that individuals fall further in love with themselves through these words and through these communal events," Joy said. "That's always the greatest hope."

Joy is a poet, singer/songwriter, storyteller, educator and revolutionary based in Denver. She channels her creativity through poetry, hip-hop, song, graphic design and fashion. Through her role as county poet laureate, she hopes to find beautiful ways to create poetry in the community and help residents fall in love with the art form.

"Sincerely" will enable Joy to connect with Adams County residents and to create original works inspired by their experience. In the first year, Joy will spark civic dialogue, amplify voices, break down barriers between the community and poetry as an art form, and enrich the lives of residents through access to arts and culture.

"Sincerely" has three main components: a public programming series, commissioned poetry and original works, and public readings.

"Kerrie's passion for poetry, community, and representation will inspire future generations of poets locally," said Stacie Ledden, Anythink director of strategic partnerships. "Many people may not yet see poetry as a tool for expression, healing and cultural understanding — Kerrie is the perfect person to engage in these creative discussions while showcasing her own voice and talent."







7UP cake is one of the most famous. For this recipe, 7-Up or Sprite works great.

#### **SODA POP LEMON BUNDT CAKE**

CAKE INGREDIENTS

- 1 box lemon cake mix
- 2 eggs

- 3/4 cup vegetable oil
- 1 (4-ounce) instant lemon pudding
- 3/4 cup lemon soda pop, not sugar-free

LEMON GLAZE INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 2 teaspoons lemon/lime soda
- 1 teaspoon milk

#### **DIRECTIONS**

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Spray 10-inch Bundt pan with nonstick spray.

In mixer bowl, beat cake mix, eggs, oil, pudding mix, soda pop for 2 minutes. Pour batter evenly in prepared pan. Bake 45-55 minutes until center tests done.

Loosen and remove to pretty cake plate. Cool completely.

In small bowl, make glaze: mix powdered sugar, soda pop, milk to pourable consistency. Drizzle over cooled cake.

including "defunding the police, politicizing student loans, provoking inflation with excessive spending, creating open borders (and) decimating our domestic energy production" have Americans concerned about the direction of the country and looking to Republicans for a course correction.

"But their hope for Republicans to take decisive action may be in vain," he said. "Our nation is on a collision course with reality, and a steadfast commitment to truth even uncomfortable truths — is the only way forward.'

Buck said that many Republican leaders are lying to America: claiming the 2020 election was stolen, Jan. 6 was simply an unguided tour of the Capitol, and the prosecutions of those involved are a weaponization of the justice system.

"These insidious narratives breed widespread cynicism and erode Americans' confidence in the rule of law," he said. "It is impossible for the Republican Party to confront our problems and offer a course correction for the future while being obsessively fixated on retribution and vengeance for contrived injustices of the past.'

The MAGA Republicans and Donald Trump have significantly departed from the enduring principles of conservatives, according to

"We belong to the party of Abraham Lincoln and Ronald Reagan; our movement has always been fueled by immutable truths about human nature, individual liberty, and economic freedoms," he said. "The Republican Party of today, however, is ignoring self-evident truths about the rule of law and limited government in exchange for self-serving lies."

Buck added that too many members would rather garner Instagram likes than make the hard decisions of governing.

"I made a decision to leave Congress because tough votes are being replaced by social media status," he

Buck, 64, serves on the House Judiciary Committee, the House Foreign Affairs Committee, and several subcommittees.

According to his website, he worked his way through high school, college and law school as a janitor, truck driver, furniture mover and ranch hand. After law school he worked for then-Rep. Dick Cheney, R-Wyo., on the Iran-Contra investigation and then became a prosecutor with the U.S. Department of Justice. He joined the Colorado U.S. Attorney's Office in 1990 and, starting in 2004, he was elected Weld County District Attorney three times before running for Congress.

Buck is a member of the hardright House Freedom Caucus and is recognized as one of the most conservative members of Congress, but his recent voting record has raised the ire of those in his party who don't believe he is conservative enough.

Buck was one of eight Republicans who joined Democrats in an Oct. 3 vote that removed Rep. Kevin McCarthy as Speaker of the House. Buck's vote against McCarthy was based on his belief in conservative fiscal responsibility.

He had voted previously against two continuing resolutions brokered by McCarthy - the early summer bill to suspend the debt ceiling until Jan. 1, 2025, in exchange for federal spending caps, and the Sept. 30 stopgap bill to fund the government through Nov. 17 to avoid a government shutdown. He also spoke out against McCarthy's launch of an impeachment inquiry into President Joe Biden, saying that House Republicans were rely-

ing on flimsy evidence.

Buck further angered the right wing of his party when he opposed Rep. Jim Jordan, R-Ohio, in his bid for Speaker of the House. The Colorado Republican Party, which Buck once led as its chairman, endorsed Jordan and urged supporters to contact Buck about his vote. Buck's office was barraged by tens of thousands of phone calls, and he and other Republicans who voted against Jordan were the target of death threats. Buck was also evicted from his office in Windsor — an action said to have been the result of his refusal to vote for Jordan.

Buck opposed Jordan because of the Ohio congressman's election denialism, but he eventually threw his support behind Rep. Mike Johnson, R-La., for House Speaker, despite Johnson's own efforts to overturn the results of the 2020 election.

When asked to explain the apparent disconnect by NBC reporter Andrea Mitchell Nov. 1, Buck said that Johnson's legal challenge of the election was at least a step up from the response of other members of Congress.

"Mike went to the Supreme Court with a challenge to the election," he said. "I think going to the courts is one thing. Trying to move the mob from the mall up to the house floor and interrupting the congressional proceeding is a whole different is-

Mitchell asked Buck how he sees the future of the House.

"Is it impossible for any Republican such as yourself who doesn't deny the election [or side with] the MAGA people and Donald Trump to work with the leadership and be effective?" she asked.

"I don't think it's impossible, but I think, from my own perspective ... the civility in politics is less now, (as is) the ability to deal with major issues," Buck said. "But I hope the party will come together. We obviously have a lot of very important issues, and hopefully will unite behind Israeli funding, Ukraine funding, and the continuing resolution we need to pass."

Buck said that, while he is leaving the House, he will continue to voice his beliefs.

"I'm going to be leaving Congress, but I'm not leaving the party, and I'm not leaving my role in trying to talk truth to the public," he said.
