'Burg sex assault under Title IX review

Students still in school. Differences between staff and student discipline measures remain unclear

STRASBURG — While a federal sex discrimination and harassment law has been cited for Strasburg middle school students remaining in class since an early April assault between students, why Hemphill Middle School staff and coaches remain on administrative leave remains unannounced.

In front of a packed audience during the May 12 Strasburg School Board meeting, Superintendent Kelle Bongard reported that back-to-back incidents April 8-9 have fallen under Title IX and that the legislation does not allow disciplinary actions to be levied until the federal investigation is concluded. But, while students involved are allowed to still attend classes and participate in extracurricular activities, a handful of middle school administrators and coaches have been on paid administrative leave since April 11.

Whether a separate district staff disciplinary policy was used to suspend the staff members is unknown despite public comment that included a question inquiring about the inconsistencies between student and staff attendance.

In follow-up comments late last week, Bongard acknowledged public unrest regarding the situation but reiterated privacy concerns when not answering questions about the varying disciplinary decisions. the federal level. Despite public ily members of situation to rundecisions.

"Please understand that the district is unable to process. share details regarding any ongoing investigations, as doing so would violate privacy laws and confi-

dentiality protocols," she stated in a May 17 e-mail response. "Any information beyond what we have already provided would inadvertently disclose more than we are legally permitted to share. My sincere hope is for the community to know that I am committed to fully adhering to district policies and prioritizing student safety above all else.

"I am genuinely saddened by the mistrust that has developed between some members of the community and the school district. Please know that I will continue to work tirelessly to rebuild that trust for as long as I am given the opportunity to do so."

As the meeting commenced, school board president Michael Marrero reiterated, "We take our responsibilities for confidentiality seriously, within applicable laws and regulations. Once the investigation is complete, we'll take the appropriate action."

During the board meeting, Bongard did confirm that a third-party external investigator and decision-maker has been assigned the investigation, which has an undetermined timeline.

During discussion about Title IX, the board approved reverting back from the 2024 version of the law to 2020 because of an administrative change at the federal level.

Despite public calls for more transparency, family members of students involved asked for the investigation to run its course and also reported that the school district has been supportive through the

Tornadoes demolish homes, solar farm near Bennett

At approximately 1 p.m. May 18, tornadoes touched down, wreaking havoc west of Bennett. While the first funnels reportedly touched down around Manila Road south of I-70, storm activity moved northeast with most of the preliminary damage occurring from Highway 36 and Harback Road west of town and moving in a northeasterly pattern to 88th Avenue east of Highway 79. At press time Sunday afternoon, preliminary reports from local fire districts and the Adams and Arapahoe County Sheriff's offices indicated that at least 10 homes were directly hit but that there were no injuries. The solar farm at the intersection of Highway 36 and Harback Road received significant damage and power lines were downed along much of 38th Avenue. What is in Colorado's budget for education?

Colorado lawmakers approved a state budget for next year that has more money for colleges, universities, and K-12 schools. But the increase is less than what was promised or re-

Lawmakers finalized the \$43.9 billion spending plan for the 2025-26 year earlier this week after months of debate about how to close a \$1.2 billion spending shortfall. The shortfall was caused by increased costs for programs such as Medicaid and voter-approved caps on state spending.

Lawmakers had promised more funding for K-12 schools through a school finance formula rewrite last vear. But the shortfall means the increase will be about \$16 million less than originally expected.

Colleges and universities will also get far less than higher education leaders requested. Instead, lawmakers will allow them more flexibility in raising tuition rates to cover expens-

The budget also provides increases for the state's early childhood initia-

Gov. Jared Polis signed the budget bill into law April 28.

"The students have shown more grace and empathy than the adults, especially on social media," one parent said. "The lack of understanding is disheartening. There are answers you are not entitled to."

A second parent added, "Instead of questioning the board, let's have the important conversations between parents and students. The school has acted on guidance we provided."

While the school district's review into last month's incidents continue, the law enforcement investigation has been closed without charges being pressed.

While Title IX is most commonly known for overseeing equity of athletic activities between girls and boys, it also includes an investigatory arm for sex-based harassment and sexual violence and discrimination based on pregnancy or parental status.

STAFF VACANCIES

Among personnel items approved was another handful-plus of staff not returning for 2025-26. According to Bongard and outgoing Human Resource Director Connie Crego, the staff vacancy rate reached about 18%, which they said was a "normal average." Elementary and middle school vacancies are mostly filled with more positions still open in the high school.

NEW CURRICULUM

More than \$308,000 was approved for curriculum starting next school year.

- Taylor said a projected 52% in medical insurance premiums has resulted in the district moving to an Individual Coverage Health Reimbursement Arrangement (ICHRA), which allows employees to select their own plan and be reimbursed for their expenses.
- Bongard said efforts are underway to improve the rate of parent responses to end-of-year satisfaction surveys and that dis-enrollment surveys will be distributed to students and families that are leaving the district.
- The next regularly scheduled board meeting is at 6 p.m., Monday, June 9, at the Central Services Building, 2102 Wagner St.

We are writing to you today to address the recent front page article that was published in reference to a sexual assault case at Hemphill Middle School. This is completely outrageous and irresponsible.

Journalists are tasked with gathering information and reporting that information to the public. This is an important job as many people consume what is written, in our community, at *The I-70 Scout*. It is the responsibility of the paper to write articles that accurately inform the public, hold the powers to be accountable through transparency, and keep the community involved. It is also the responsibility of the paper to adhere to a set of moral standards and ethics — which did not happen in the sexual assault article.

You have further victimized minor children involved in an active investigation by publishing graphic details that did not need to be reported. This is a perfect example of "just because you can, doesn't mean you should." Just because you can access a "report" doesn't mean that you should write a summary and report it to the public. In the future, it would be in the best interest of all of *The I-70 Scout* consumers if you adhered to these journalism ethics.

There is no defense for this irresponsible and outrageous publication. No good is going to come from publishing this article. It has us questioning the accuracy and ethics of the newspaper. We are wondering what kind of perverted and demented mind it takes to publish and exploit, in such graphic detail, a minor child. Report and fight the fight you want to fight — however, it is imperative that you do so without causing lasting consequences.

The wounds that you have caused can't be reversed — so, to prevent further harm we demand that you make a public apology and retract the article from all online sources immediately. Further, it would be in the best interest of the community to review your morals and ethics and make a statement of action that you will be taking to never make this grave error again.

I am writing to express my absolute outrage and deep disappointment over *The I-70 Scout*'s recent decision to publish and discuss details of an ongoing investigation involving a minor. Your coverage was not only shockingly irresponsible but a disturbing breach of journalistic ethics and basic human decency.

To publish identifying or suggestive details while an investigation involving a child is still active is indefensible. Children are among the most vulnerable in our society and they deserve to be protected from the harsh and permanent judgment of public exposure — especially during traumatic and uncertain times.

Your article showed a reckless disregard for the well-being of the minor involved, their family, and the integrity of the investigative process. The tone and content of your reporting prioritized sensationalism over sensitivity, discretion and ethical standards. The fact that *The I-70 Scout* would exploit such a sensitive matter involving a child for the sake of engagement or readership is appalling.

Let me be clear: This is not an issue of poor taste — this is a violation of a child's right to privacy and safety. You have caused harm, not just to the individuals involved, but to the credibility of your publication and to the trust of the community you serve.

I demand that *The I-70 Scout* issue a public apology to the affected parties, immediately remove or redact any content that could further identify or harm the minor, and conduct a thorough review of your editorial standards and oversight. There is still an ongoing investigation through the Department of Education Title IX. The parents have the ability to pause charges being filed through the Adams County Sheriff's Office. They are waiting to get all of the facts before moving forward. Not partial facts, not implications. They want to have the full picture. When the investigation is complete, the Title IX investigator will have the ability to administer and recommend charges and other consequences.

Again, the parents are waiting for final results, recommendations and procedures. They want to get it right. They need all of the pertinent information so they can make decisions that are best for their child. Their child, not the child of public opinion. The parents are very aware that charges through Adams County Sheriff's Office can be made for another year. There's no hurry to get it wrong, they want to get it right despite the time involved.

Can you imagine trying to be patient, waiting for all of the facts to come out while being crucified on social media?

It's absurd, unfair and sad that this family is being revictimized by those that are uninformed and righteousness and think they know everything they need to know to judge.

Do you realize that the 13-year-old assault victim saw the headline and read it? Now he knows that kids at school, teachers, friends, family and community members know the details of the assault. How could your paper do that to a 13-year-old? Shameful.

If you think family is not upset by this, think they don't have the fortitude to do what is needed, you are wrong. This family has the love and strength to carry this to the end, while providing for the needs of their son and younger daughter.

They are owed an apology for the fire fueled by your story. They didn't deserve that. They didn't deserve any of it.

Dear Editor:

I'm going to be 70 in December. Over those years, I've had several experiences and training in child sexual assault and sexual exploitation of minors. Starting with me, I was molested by a neighbor boy that was much older than I was. I was 5 at the time, and I never told anyone what happened to me, much less who the perpetrator was. When I was 35, my mother whispered in my ear the name of the perpetrator and hinted at what had happened.

My mother was a phenomenal person. She was trained as a psychiatric nurse and spent 45 years in that profession, except for one year in 1972 as an Army nurse at Fitzsimmons Army Hospital. She is no stranger to trauma of every sort. I've had many discussions with her, and she has augmented my education in psychology. I do have a degree in the subject.

Over the years, I married and had seven children. I also had to deal with the trauma in my in-laws and a very unpleasant task it was. My seven children were all raised in Bennett Schools and graduated from Bennett. The youngest two graduated from Byers. Of my five sons, one became a police officer and had a brilliant career. He became a member of the SWAT team and later a homicide detective. He also worked on a joint local and federal task force fighting human trafficking. We, too, have had discussions on sexual assault, and my son also added to my education on the subject.

The recent events at Hemphill Middle School have deeply troubled me on several levels. It is troubling to my family and my friends, along with my neighbors and the local people in places of responsibility in our community.

I offer this analogy to help mend things. It's like a surgeon cutting out a cancer. He has to inflict some pain and create a scar but, in the long run, the cancer was eradicated and the patient is better off. In my opinion, the best way to deal with this situation is for everyone involved to take some time to reflect on their own actions and check if they have behaved properly, according to their individual responsibilities, and admit any errors they find in themselves and exhibit patience in giving others time to search their souls and their shortcomings.

We make mistakes as young people, adults, parents, and people in authority. The trick is to openly admit them and not repeat them.



Finalists will be the 12 competitors who have the highest number of votes during the last week of May and into the first week of June. The competition will conclude on June 5, and the grand prize winner will be announced by July 3.

With increasing danger from natuen the county's ability to anticipate, ral hazards such as extreme temperarespond to, and recover from disruptures, wildfire, drought, floods and setions, such as natural disasters, health vere storms, the need for preparation amidst natural and human-caused disasters has become increasingly critical to ensure lives and livelihoods are protected, risks are mitigated, and community members thrive, according to a release.

The plan emphasizes around five core areas: data utilization; organizational capacity; communication, education and awareness; stakeholder engagement; and funding and finance.

Within these areas, the plan includes a clear road map for building long-term resilience across county operations and the broader commu-
