

The wetter-than-normal late spring and early summer have been offset by recent temperature hikes past 90 degrees, leading to projections of a near normal wheat harvest around the Fourth of July. The 10-day forecast dated June 27 also projected temperatures at least in the high 80s with little chance for rain. Colorado harvest was approximately 1% complete at the end of last week, starting in the southeast corner. Commuters are reminded to be patient and safe as combines and other harvesting equipment navigate local roadways.





\$40K OK'd for '25 Bennett grants

BENNETT — The Board of Trustees June 24 approved \$40,000 in funding for seven recipients of the 2025 Bennett Gives Back Grant.



Jerry attended a one-room elemen-Jerry volunteered as a member of tary school and a Catholic high school affiliated with Assumption Abby, a monastery in Richardton, N.D. After graduating high school in 1963, he joined the monastery, where he stayed for five years.

> "I was a Benedictine monk," he said. "All we did was work and pray."

Jerry enjoyed the work, and his time at the monastery served as a training ground for his future endeavors.

"I worked in the carpentry shop, the print shop, and the library there," he said. "I even butchered a cow for myself. I also learned beekeeping there when I helped another brother with the bees. They probably had 15 hives. As a devoted member of the Knights They were set up for processing honey

Jerry's last six months at the monastery were spent living on a nearby Indian reservation helping residents.

"I liked working with the Indians," he said. "I hauled grain and cattle, helped with home repairs, and picked up people to bring them to a little church there affiliated with the monasterv.'

After five years, Jerry decided to leave the monastery and look for a job in the outside world. He noted he had "no idea of money" — no one received a salary at the monastery.

"I remember going to the print shop of a daily newspaper to ask for a job, and I told them I had some experience in printing," he said. "The owner asked how much I'd be expected to be paid. I said maybe a dollar and a quarter. The guy said he'd probably pay me more than that."

Jerry went on to work for two daily newspapers in North Dakota – the Bismark Tribune and Dickenson Press. He met his late wife at that time and, when they were both laid off from their printing jobs in 1972, they moved to Byers, where they had family ties.

"We went to the (typographical) union in Denver and we both got jobs right away," Jerry said. "My wife worked for the Rocky Mountain News and I worked at Hirschfeld Press, a commercial print shop."

Typesetting in the 1970s was done with linotype machines.

"We had linotypes and drawers of lettering that we could lay out," Jerry said.

Printing processes changed, but Jerry found other work that he found equally fulfilling. In the late '70s, he was hired by Arapahoe County, where he worked in the road and bridge department for 23 years as a heavy equipment operator and supervisor. His skills and leadership earned him the distinction of Employee of the Year during that time.

Jerry also worked for Schmidt Ready Mix, now defunct, at Strasburg for 12 years, continuing his commitment to hands-on, skilled labor that contributed to the development of the region.

"I loved working in the gravel pits," he said, adding that sand was dug out from the banks of Bijou Creek. "I'd

haul the sand; another guy would wash the sand; then I'd haul it about a mile to Ready Mix.'

The sand was used to make concrete. Jerry said that one job that he didn't particularly love was driving a cement truck.

"I always thanked the Lord when I got back to the plant every night with that truck," he said.

Jerry said he has been fascinated with bees ever since he helped the beekeeper in the monastery in his youth.

"I've been beekeeping in Colorado since 1975," he noted, adding that he and others founded the Eastern Colorado Beekeepers Association in 2016. He enjoys mentoring aspiring beekeepers.

He currently has 10 beehives and sells honey out of his home. He often gets calls to collect swarms of bees. Some he boxes and keeps, others are installed with other beekeepers.

"I've always been set up to extract honey," he said. "In 1975 I went to Montgomery Ward on South Broadway in Denver and bought my first honey extractor equipment, which I still use to this day. Those days you could buy just about anything in that store.

Jerry's many passions include his 1969 Chevelle Super Sport 396. He is the original owner.

"I don't want to let it go," he said. "Some stuff you just never want to part with.'

At 81, Jerry is thankful that he's able to continue to work, serve and enjoy life.

"I've been blessed, and I like to help others," he said. "These days, though, I work hard one day, and I've got to rest the next."

A prostate cancer survivor, Jerry has been cancer-free for more than four years.

"It's funny, when I was told by the doctor I had prostrate cancer, I didn't even get upset. I just put my hand in the Lord's; he took care of it, and here I am. There's a lot of stuff we fret about, but faith will get you a long ways.'

Jerry lives his life with heart, humility and a deep commitment to serving others. His quiet dedication is making a powerful and lasting difference in his family, church and community.







service provider in surrounding areas, this purchase allows us to expand our reach into the Strasburg community and provide the same excellent service that we provide to our current members," said Eastern Slope CEO Bradley Welp in an April press release. "We are excited for the opportunity to improve broadband services for our neighbors in the Strasburg area, expanding opportunities for education, health care, remote work compatibility, entertainment, e-commerce, and business operations.'

TDS has owned the Strasburg office and network since 1991.

"We are confident there will be a seamless transition of operations, said TDS Telecom President and CEO Jim Butman in April.

Eastern Slope has been operating for seven-plus decades and serves multiple other Eastern Colorado communities - Arriba, Eads, Flagler, Genoa, Haswell, Hugo, Karval, Kit Carson and Woodrow. Eastern Slope's home office is in Hugo.

Completion of the purchase was originally expected during the second quarter of 2025.

While completion of the agreement was uncertain as of June 26, at least one long-awaited service to Strasburg the Strasburg phone office. has already been restored.

After a series of tests were conducted June 25, Strasburg's emergency siren was deemed operational and will sound off during certain emergencies, particularly tornadoes, nearby wildfires, and other weather-based issues. Eastern Slope Rural Telephone's presence along the I-70 Corridor will almost double when its purchase of TDS Telecom's Strasburg phone network is completed. The cooperative currently has an ESTech office in the Bennett Marketplace development along with a shop/equipment yard in Bennett.

"They've been great to work with and got us back up and running after a lot of years without it," said Strasburg Fire Protection District Board President Jeff Thain during the June 26 board meeting. "It's not a cure-all, but it's sure nice to have it available."

Whether the siren will blare every-

should be a help," Smith said. "With the help of Capt. [Evan] Hickey, we are developing a [Standard Operating Procedure] for wildland fire deployments. Trying to put together some engine boss kits as well.'

Smith also reported that a grant request has been submitted for wildland fire personal protective equipment (PPE).

"Elizabeth Fire is overseeing a larger grant and our \$5,000 request is already in," he said. "It's first come, first served, so hopefully we are in early enough.'

Assistant Fire Chief and Fire Marshal Pat Conroy, who served as chief the past couple of years, added that a couple of staff have already completed full hazmat operations training and will not have to participate in that section of fire academy.

During the announcement of the repair of the emergency siren, Board President Jeff Thain reiterated that one long siren of 3-5 minutes signifies a tornado warning with two consecutive short blasts, meaning the threat is no longer.

"It's two cycles of the horn backto-back and that's the 'all clear," he said. "We'll also try to blast it for any wildfires nearby or if something else severe happens.'

While board members and staff said they are glad to have the air horn available again, it doesn't have extensive reach out of Strasburg proper and residents are urge to utilize other notification options.

The board also gave direction to district staff to continue efforts to subscribe to the CodeRed notification service to allow it to send out reverse 911 notifications to district residents when emergencies occur. Smith said he plans to meet with Strasburg School Superintendent Kelle Bongard to see whether the two entities might jointly subscribe to the CodeRed service, which costs about \$1,800 per year. Other partners in and around Strasburg are also sought.

OTHER BUSINESS

Conroy reported that May call responses were flat but that in-district responses remain ahead of last year.

Overall, year-to-date responses through May were 468, compared to 458 last year and 472 in 2023 but, within Strasburg's district, that figure was 302, up from 279 last year and 277 two years ago.

Conroy noted that the wet spring and summer has resulted in a slow start to outdoor fire season.

"Responded only to one fire in May - a small vegetation fire - and nothing since," he said. "Last year by now, we had already responded to 20ish. This weather might last a little bit longer but who knows what that might mean for the fall.'

The board approved two more firehouse improvement projects - parking and storage shed improvements and remodeling of the station's interior - with the expenditures to not exceed \$110,000.

The long-awaited crew quarters project was completed earlier this year.

New development within district boundaries has picked up recently with Pulte Homes making permit request for eight new homes in Wolf Creek Run West and the developer recently submitting initial review packets for another 40 lots in the same subdivision. Conroy also added that several "housing starts" are occurring on the Arapahoe County side of the district, which should "bode well for ongoing impact fee revenue."

On the issue of impact fees, Controy indicated he has made a legal inquiry concerning what kind of projects can be funded by impact fees. The board expressed interest in installing a new emergency siren in the area of the Wolf Creek Run developments but whether that is among the type of projects covered by impact fee revenue is uncertain.

EMS Division Chief Mackenzie Schledorn-Rudden said she is continuing to finalize the list of providers for the inaugural Strasburg Hometown Days Health Care Fair. In addition to representatives of University of Colorado Health and the Adams County Health Department, Schledorn-Rudden is hopeful local providers will also be part of this year's event.

In other Hometown Days discussion, board members reiterated that 2025 is likely the last year that the fire district and department put on the annual fireworks show; however, they also appeared to leave open the possibility of continuing the annual Friday night light show if additional sponsors or partners show interest and can assist in fundraising.

Hometown Days is Aug. 7-10.

Hot weather: Driving temperatures rise; speeding increases notably

es traffic as people spend more time away from overs. home and road trips become more frequent.

Clear roads with nicer weather coupled with control a car, especially in unexpected situations. traffic congestion can contribute to feelings of impatience and aggression.

"The temptation to speed is a real issue for hood of collisions. some drivers, whether it is time pressure, an adrenaline rush, or a lack of awareness of the risks toward others," said Col. Mathew C. Packard, Colorado State Patrol chief. "Yet, controlling this urge is the responsibility of every license

Last year, according to Colorado State Patrol data, speeding citations peaked in April (4,341) and remained high through October. Troopers issued over 47,000 speeding citations in 2024.

Speed limits are set based on road design and traffic volume. Exceeding these limits is risky. By understanding the dangers associated with speeding, drivers can all work for safer roadways and preventing unnecessary accidents.

Speeding raises the risk of accidents and their severity. Here's how:

GOLDEN — Warmer weather often increas- vehicles, especially tall ones, more prone to roll-

Reduced control: Speeding reduces the ability to

Extended stopping distances: The faster you drive, the longer it takes to stop, increasing the likeli-

Compromised safety features: Safety features are less effective at higher speeds, leading to more serious injuries.

Decreased reaction time: Speeding reduces the time you have to react to hazards, making it harder to avoid accidents.

Greater impact force: Higher speeds result in more forceful impacts, causing more severe damage and injuries.

In Colorado, points and penalties for traffic violations increase based on the severity of the violation. Troopers are taking a low-tolerance approach to the top fatal crash factors, including lane violations and speeding while launching a three-month campaign called "Stop Speeding."

The campaign wants every driver to break the myth that speeding is a "victimless crime" and to **Increased rollover accidents:** Higher speeds make drive like a trooper is riding with them.



Farm Bureau releases '25 results of July 4 Summer Cookout Survey

An Independence Day cookout will cost, on average, \$70.92 for 10 guests this year, based on the 2025 American Farm Bureau Federation annual marketbasket survey, which is roughly 30 cents less than 2024.

The national average cost of this year's cookout for 10 is \$70.92, down from 2024's record-high \$71.22. At \$7.09 per person, 2025 will be the second-highest cost since Farm Bureau began the survey in 2013.

The national average retail price for 2 pounds of ground beef increased 4.4% to \$13.33. Pork and beans will cost \$2.69, up 20 cents from 2024. Potato salad is up 6.6% to \$3.54.

Several factors influence the increases, reflecting the sort of challenges farmers regularly face. Fewer cattle are available for processing, which is affecting beef supplies; steel and aluminum tariffs mean increased prices on canned goods; and the cost of eggs used in potato salad — remains elevated, although they are much lower than record highs earlier this year as egg-laying chicken populations recover from avian influenza.

"Inflation and lower availability of some food items continue to keep prices stubbornly high for America's families," said AFBF Associate Economist Samantha Ayoub. "High prices don't mean more money for farmers, however. Farmers are price-takers, not price-makers. Their share of the food retail dollar is just 15%. The cost of running their farm is up, from labor and transportation to taxes."

Chicken fettucine alfredo sold at Kroger and Walmart stores tied to deadly listeria outbreak

A listeria food poisoning outbreak that has killed three people and led to one pregnancy loss is linked to newly recalled heat-and-eat chicken fettucine alfredo products sold at Kroger and Walmart stores, federal health officials said last month.

The outbreak, which includes at least 17 people in 13 states, began last July, officials said. At least 16 people have been hospitalized.


FreshRealm, a large food producer with sites in California, Georgia and Indiana, is recalling products made before June 17. The recall includes these products, which were sold in the refrigerated sections of retail stores:

- 32.8-ounce travs of Marketside Grilled Chicken Alfredo with Fettucine Tender Pasta with Creamy Alfredo Sauce, White Meat Chicken and Shaved Parmesan Cheese with best-by dates of June 27 or earlier.
- 12.3-ounce trays of Marketside Grilled Chicken Alfredo with Fettucine Tender Pasta with Creamy Alfredo Sauce, White Meat Chicken, Broccoli and Shaved Parmesan Cheese with best-by dates of June 26 or earlier.
- 12.5-ounce trays of Home Chef Heat & Eat Chicken Fettucine Alfredo with Pasta, Grilled White Meat Chicken and Parmesan Cheese, with best-by dates of June 19 or earlier.

The strain of listeria bacteria that made people sick was found in a sample of chicken fettucine alfredo during a routine inspection in March, U.S. Agriculture Department officials said. That product was destroyed and never sent to stores.

Officials said they have not identified the specific source of the contamination. Cases have been identified through retail shopper records and interviews with sick people.

The listeria strain tied to the outbreak has been detected in people who fell ill between July 24 and May 10,

the U.S. Centers for Disease Control & Prevention reported. The deaths were in Illinois, Michigan and Texas. Cases have been reported in Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, North Carolina, Nevada, Ohio, South Carolina Texas and Virginia.

The number of sick people is likely higher than now known and cases may be detected in additional states. Officials are continuing to receive reports of illnesses linked to the product and "are concerned that contamination is still occurring," the CDC said.

Consumers shouldn't eat the products, which may be in their refrigerators or freezers. They should be thrown away or returned to the place of purchase.

Listeria infections can cause serious illness, particularly in older adults people with weakened immune systems and those who are pregnant or their newborns. Symptoms include fever, muscle aches, headache, stiff neck, confusion, loss of balance and convulsions.

About 1,600 people get sick each vear from listeria infections and about 260 die, the CDC said.

Federal officials in December said they were revamping protocols to prevent listeria infections after several high-profile outbreaks, including one linked to Boar's Head deli meats that led to 10 deaths and more than 60 illnesses last year.
