3 die, 1 injured in crash near Cedar Point


CEDAR POINT — Three members of a Montana family, including two children, were killed and another member seriously injured when their SUV collided with a semi and trailer mid-afternoon July 2.

At approximately 2:30 p.m., the Colorado State Patrol and emergency responders were dispatched near mile marker 348 in the area of the Cedar Point exit on eastbound I-70 on re-

Water valve issues continue to flood Bennett town gov't

BENNETT - The breadth of the negative residential impacts from the town of Bennett's ongoing effort to convert its water system to a single pressure zone continue to grow.

During the June 24 board of trustees meeting, Capital Projects & Utilities Director Daniel Pershing said that the town's ongoing Pressure Reducing Valve (PRV) Program would affect 882 homes.

Town officials have repeatedly suggested the plumbing upgrades are standard on new homes and that PRV upgrades would only be required on older homes; however, Pershing's estimate indicates that most homes built on the Adams County side of Bennett before the past few years could be impacted.

Area roots run deep for DT Rodeo parade Grand Marshals

DEER TRAIL — if you're seeking the quintessential candidates for the Grand Marshals of the Deer Trail Rodeo, look no further than Raymond and Donna Morris.

Raymond's great-grandfather came to Eastern Colorado in the 1860s — early enough to conceivably have been present at the first Deer Trail Rodeo in 1869. Raymond grew up near Deer Trail where his family ranched and farmed for generations. His memories of Deer Trail rodeos stretch back to the late 1940s.

Raymond and Donna are rodeo enthusiasts and travel to several rodeos each year. In short, they tick all the boxes for the title of Grand Marshals and the honors the title bestows.

Raymond's great-grandfather, Alex Benham, arrived in Colorado from New York in 1860. He lived

in Julesburg and was the proprietor of a stagecoach and pony express station on the Smoky Hill Trail.

"During much of the 1860s and '70s he worked various routes in Colorado, Wyoming, Kansas, Nebraska and South Dakota," Raymond told The I-70 Scout July 4. "In 1880 Alex and his son — my grandfather Jay Benham — began cattle and sheep ranching north of Deer Trail. Family members have ranched and farmed in the same area since."

Jay Benham established a desert claim on land located 18 miles northeast of Byers in 1886. (The Desert Land Act of 1887 amended the Homestead Act and encouraged development of arid and semiarid public lands in certain Western states.)

"The family ranch has always been in the Leader area, but Leader wasn't there until 1909," Raymond noted.

Jay Benham and his wife Louise had four chil-

Arapahoe Co conditionally OKs application for oil, gas pad near Quincy, Watkins Road

LITTLETON - Arapahoe County has conditionally approved an application for the State La Plata South oil and gas facility to support up to 17 wells plus two existing wells for a total of 19 wells.

The site is a 10.5-acre pad (23 acres total disturbed area) located approximately 1.5 miles south of East Ouincy Avenue and one-half mile west of Watkins Road in unincorporated Arapahoe County.

Public Works & Development evaluated the application based on oil and gas regulations in Arapahoe County's Land Development Code (LDC). In 2023 and 2024, the county amended the LDC with additional rules crafted with health, safety, welfare and the environment at the forefront of consideration.

These rules include rigorous air/ water quality testing requirements, financial assurances for cleanup, and the most protective setbacks in Colorado.

After a thorough review and in consultation with multiple departments and outside agencies, Public Works & Development determined that the proposed State La Plata South facility meets - and in many areas exceeds the county's criteria or has qualified for a waiver.

Mineral rights are property rights protected by Colorado law and take precedence over surface rights, meaning that mineral rights owners have a legal right to enter and use the surface of a property in a reasonable and necessary manner to extract minerals. As the applicant met or exceeded all required criteria, Public Works & Development Director Bryan Weimer approved the well pad application with the following conditions:

Lawmakers press wildlife chiefs on troubled wolf reintro

Program expenses have far exceeded initial estimate presented to Colorado voters

The head of Colorado Parks & Wildlife told lawmakers June 30 that the department's "preference" is to release more wolves into the state next year, despite calls to pause the reintroduction program.

"I don't have the right answer to whether or not a pause is the right thing to do, or get the last 15 (wolves) out and move on to the management piece," said CPW Director Jeff Davis. 'Every time we release more animals, it's more emotional and difficult for us to pull off that operation, and it's also challenging for the (livestock) producers at the same time.'

Davis appeared in front of the Colorado Legislature's Water Resources & Agriculture Review Committee to give an update on the state's wolf reintroduction plan, which voters approved in 2020. Wildlife officials have released 25 wolves since December 2023 from Oregon and Canada.

The initial goal was to release 10-15 per year for three to five years, beginning in 2023, to reach a stable population of at least 50 wolves in the state.

Davis said the department's preference is to sign a new agreement with British Columbia to relocate more wolves from Canada.

But the program is highly controversial, especially among rural Colorado farmers and ranchers who decry wolves killing their livestock. Between April 2024 and April 2025, wolves killed at least 25 cattle and sheep, according to the recently released annual report on the reintroduction effort.

The Copper Creek pack was responsible for many livestock deaths in Grand County in 2023, prompting Parks & Wildlife to capture the six wolves September and release them alongside the Canadian wolves in a different part of the state earlier this year. That decision, producers said

"A depredating pack was known to have depredated in Oregon before they put them in Middle Park. They had a serious impact there. They packaged them up, put them away for a while, and then they put them back out right in my backyard," said Tom Harrington, a cattle producer in the Roaring Fork Valley.

A September 2024 petition filed by a coalition of livestock associations requested a pause in CPW's reintroduction plans until the agency could implement strategies to stop depredations. The Parks & Wildlife commission rejected the petition in January.

'I believe that we need no more new releases until plans are in place and the basics are working," Harrington said. "We need metrics to measure the success of what this program is. I believe we can — and here comes that word that I really don't like — coexist with the wolves that choose to not prey on our livestock.'

CPW has worked through some

ing defining "chronic depredation" as three or more depredations by the same wolf or wolves within 30 days. The division has also outlined a lethal removal approach that starts by killing one or two wolves, evaluating the pack's behavior and its effect on depredation, then considering additional lethal removals. Parks & Wildlife also started a range rider program to deploy riders in areas with high wolf conflict to "proactively haze predators using non-lethal techniques," according to the annual report.

"The idea of a pause continues to make sense to me, if it creates more time for more robust implementation and completion of those seven items, and maybe now beyond those seven,' said House Speaker Julie McCluskie, a Dillon Democrat. "But I think the entire reintroduction and restoration is at risk if we can't get our legs underneath us and be in a position to do this the way we need to.

CPW officials also told lawmakers June 30 that the cost of the reintroduction has reached about \$3 million. In 2020, voters received an estimate of \$800,000 for the program.

"I understand a lot of this money is going to ranchers and producers to help to compensate them," said Sen. Dylan Roberts, a Frisco Democrat. "That's money hopefully being well spent, but that's also money in the state of Colorado right now - in the budget situation we're in - that is not going to fixing potholes in roads. It's not going to classrooms across the state. It's not going to people who are losing their health care and many who are about to lose their health care. This seems out of control.'

Davis said many factors go into realizing the reintroduction plan that were not considered in the ballot cost estimate, such as the state's decision to compensate for livestock weight loss and fewer pregnancies due to wolf presence and the high cost of beef.





According to data from the last U.S. Census, conducted in 2020, Bennett had 1,047 housing units but that the number on the Adams County side was short of 800.

The Antelope Hills subdivision is part of Bennett, but is located in Arapahoe County and not subject to the town's PRV mandate.

The impact on individual families is

The town itself estimates homeowners will need to find an additional \$1,000 to \$1,100 within the next year to set aside for the upgrade, with about half to be refunded as a reimbursement if proper rebate protocol is followed.

Impacted residents have argued that taking that expense out of their family's budget takes away much of their safety net for unexpected expenses and that they are already paying for other shortcomings from the town — car repairs because of crumbling streets and overzealous code enforcement among them.

In addition, local plumbers have indicated that some Bennett homeowners will incur even greater expense to install an auxiliary or additional water tank to accommodate the extra water

"Putting us on one pressure zone reduces the amount of maintenance cost because otherwise we would be increasing the number of system-wide PRVs, which is both a hard cost to install them as well as a maintenance cost to upkeep them to protect these homes that are on the second pressure system now," Pershing further explained.

Town officials previously stated they considered regulating the water pressure on the municipal pipes, but determined the cost associated with the complicated upgrades to be too onerous.

"I wish there was a simpler process to get all of the system in one pressure area, but this seems to be a good path, although it costs those who weren't anticipating changing their plumbing to do this," said Trustee Royce Pin-

"The water tower just next to town hall is only able to fill up so much before causing pressure issues and this increase will help us with the system from that standpoint," Pershing add-

The town approved an increase in the rebate to \$550 to be allocated from the reserve in the water fund and extended the deadline to Sept. expense.

Curried Chicken Fried Rice

by Christopher Kimball

Christopher Kimball's Milk Street

Nigerian fried rice, seasoned with curry powder, dried thyme, and a handful of aromatics, inspired this easy weeknight meal-in-a-skillet.

Beef liver and an assortment of vegetables are classic ingredients but, in this recipe from "Milk Street 365: The All-Purpose Cookbook for Every Day of the Year," we opted for chicken thighs and fresh green beans.

Seeded, thinly-sliced jalapeño or Fresno chilies bring a pleasant heat, while curry powder adds depth, warmth and a golden hue.

Instead of using just-cooked rice, which results in a softer texture in the finished dish, we start with plain cooked rice that's been chilled and dried, a process that allows the starches to recrystallize so the grains "fry" up light and fluffy.

Fragrant basmati is especially good, but any variety of long-grain white rice works.

Fresh rice needs two hours minimum to chill adequately, but it can be prepared up to three days in advance and kept refrigerated. To chill the rice, fluff with a fork, then spread on the baking sheet. Let cool, then cover and refrigerate until cold.

Don't be afraid to really scrape up the browned bits from the surface of the skillet after you've added the broth. The caramelization gives the fried rice great depth of flavor. Serve sprinkled with scallion greens and additional sliced chili.

CURRIED CHICKEN FRIED RICE

INGREDIENTS

- 3 tablespoons neutral oil or refined coconut oil, divided

en thighs, trimmed and cut into 1-inch pieces

- · 2 teaspoons curry powder, divid-
- · kosher salt, ground black pepper
- · 4 scallions, thinly sliced, whites and greens reserved separately
- 2 tablespoons minced fresh ginger
- · 4 ounces green beans, trimmed and cut into 1-inch pieces
- · 1 teaspoon dried thyme
- 1 Fresno or jalapeño chili, stemmed, seeded and thinly sliced
- 4 cups cooked and chilled longgrain white rice, preferably bas-
- · 1 cup low-sodium chicken broth

DIRECTIONS

In a 12-inch skillet over medium-high, heat 2 tablespoons of the oil until barely smoking. Add the chicken and sprinkle with 1/2 teaspoon of the curry powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Cook, stirring occasionally, until evenly browned, 4-6 minutes.

Push the chicken to the perimeter of the pan. To the center, add the remaining 1 tablespoon oil, scallion whites and ginger; cook, stirring, until lightly browned, about 11/2 minutes.

Into the scallion mixture, stir the beans, thyme, half of the chili, the remaining 11/2 teaspoons curry powder and 1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper.

Stir the chicken into the bean mixture; cook, stirring occasionally, until the beans are bright green, about 2 minutes. Stir in the rice, then add the broth and scrape up any browned

Cook, stirring, until the liquid is absorbed, 3-5 minutes.

with the semi going at a slow speed ahead of them with its hazard lights on and straddling the line between the right lane and the shoulder," a State Patrol spokesman said. "The Subaru struck the left rear of the trailer, removing a portion of the Forester's passenger side. The Subaru spun out of control and rolled one-halfmedian.'

In addition to finding the body of the 47-year-old female front-seat passenger lying alongside the wrecked SUV, eyewitnesses and responders also found a 13-year-old girl and 10-yearold boy in the back seat deceased.

The 62-year-old male driver suffered serious but not life-threatening injuries.

"When the side of the Subaru was ripped apart it severed the front passenger's seat belt causing her to be ejected," the State Patrol preliminary accident report said. "All seat belts were in use.'

The semi driver was uninjured and able to negotiate the rig to a controlled stop, partially blocking the right lane.

A witness to the crash told metro TV stations that the Subaru's driver escaped the wreckage and asked for

Byers fire departments got the first 3:30 a.m. with the scene fully cleared call about 12:30 a.m. near mile marker 326 of westbound I-70 on report of two semis involved in a crash.

Upon arrival only one of the two semis was occupied.

"One westbound semi driver collided with the other semi that was parked on the highway," the State Patrol said.

Whether the 26-year-old male driver from Washington state was going to be charged was uncertain at press time.

The collision resulted in the moving semi overturning and losing its load of frozen chicken, which took about six hours to fully clean up. One lane of westbound traffic was reopened about reopened about 9 a.m.

Just before 7 p.m., responders were dispatched to mile marker 306 immediately east of the Lady Bird Hill overpass after an eastbound semi went off the right side of the road, crawled up the embankment, and tipped onto the driver's side. The trailer also tipped and was split open, spilling much of the boxed or bottled chicken stock it was hauling.

The driver, a 32-year-old male from Ohio, reported injury but refused transport. Whether charges would be filed was unknown at press time.


